DUBAI // Eighty students took part n a driving skills challenge yesterlay in a bid to promote safe motorng habits among young people.

The event at the Higher Colleges f Technology (HCT) Dubai Men's Campus was part of a campaign aunched recently by FedEx Express. It was supported by Dubai Police and the Emirates Motor ports Federation.

Students at five Dubai-based uniersities attended interactive lecares and took part in a simulator experience last week.

Yesterday, the campaign culminated with a driving skills chalenge competition among HCT Dubai Women's Campus, the American University in Dubai, Maipal University, HCT Dubai Men's Campus and Bits Pilani. Each uniersity nominated 16 members.

The timed challenge consisted of a slalom, which required parcipants to weave through some obstacles, a roundabout, and a of winding course. They expemenced manoeuvres to improve their car-handling abilities, work lowards improving their driving echniques and understand the concept of using skill over speed.

If a driver touched or knocked own two cones, two seconds were added to the time. If three cones were hit the driver was disqualified. "It was exciting," said Roshanara Sait, director of Ciel Marketing and events, which organised the event. Tve seen some skilled drivers. Each one wanted to have a better me than the others."

This challenge required perfect arning and timing and the skill manoeuvre around the track,"

said Zubair Ansan, 23, a media and communications student at Manipal University. "I learned that you'll lose more time if you go faster. I had to manage my speed. If you speed up, you won't have complete control of your car."

Kevin Alexander, 20, a mechani cal engineering student at the same university, said the roundabout was "a bit tricky".

"I could have done better on a couple of turns but it was fun," he said. "The J-turn was quite easy. We also had the U-turn and an S-turn."
